PART 1: READ







- To be a good writer, you must be a great reader.
- Read voraciously in the genre you want to write.
- Ask yourself: What short stories have moved me? Why?

PART 2: WRITE

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WHERE TO BEGIN

- Develop a daily writing habit (e.g. Morning Pages)
- Not everything you write needs to be publishable
- Embrace the unpublishable! It's part of the process



CHARACTERISATION & THE MDQ (MAJOR DRAMATIC QUESTION)

- Know your character inside out. Realistic and complex characters will help your readers to connect with your story
- Establish goals and motivations quickly in short stories ullet
- Introduce a Major Dramatic Question to hook the reader. It's the central ulletquestion that the story seeks to answer by the end. Typically, it revolves around the protagonist's main goal or conflict and is often phrased as a yes/no question.



EXAMPLES OF MAJOR DRAMATIC QUESTIONS

- Will the character survive being stranded alone on Mars and make it back to Earth?
- Is the AI character truly conscious and can she escape? \bullet
- Can the character lead humanity to victory against an alien invasion without ulletlosing their humanity?
- Can the character decode the code language in time to prevent global war? \bullet
- Will the character succeed in pulling off the ultimate cyberspace heist?



GMC (GOALS, MOTIVATION, CONFLICT)

- What does your character want (Goal)?
- Why do they want it (Motivation)?
- What's standing in their way (Conflict)? •

WRITING SCI-FI

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- Original 'What if?' concept: fresh, speculative premise that hasn't been explored in the same way before or that combines existing ideas in a new, surprising way
- Protagonist with high stakes: why what the character wants matters?
- World-building through hints, not walls of text
- Strong arc with twist, reveal (climax), or emotion: leave the reader with a lasting emotion or question
- Fresh perspective on tech/society

PITFALLS


- Overworldbuilding slows pace
- Jargon before emotional engagement ullet
- One storytelling mode dominates (modes include action, dialogue, description, exposition, introspection)
- Lack of reader connection with characters
- Dialogue sounds unnatural. ullet

TIP: Read your dialogue aloud with a friend.





- Keep it simple and clear
- Make the reader care
- Write every day
